Safety Share: Lightning Safety

Using proper lifting techniques can help prevent back injuries both on and off the job. Follow these tips to avoid compressing the spinal discs or straining your lower back when you are lifting:

Have a lightening safety plan- Know where you'll go for safety and how much time it will take to get there

Monitor the weather- Look for signs of a developing thunderstorm such as darkening skies, flashes of lightning or increasing wind

Get to a safe place- If you hear thunder, even a distant rumble, immediately move to a safe place. Fully enclosed buildings with wiring and plumbing provide the best protection. Sheds, picnic shelters, tents or covered porches do NOT protect you from lightning. If a sturdy building is not nearby, get into a hard-topped metal vehicle and close all the windows. Stay inside until 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder

Avoid open areas- Don't be the tallest object in the area

Stay away from isolated trees, towers, or utility poles- Lightning tends to strike the taller objects in an area.

Stay away from metal conductors-Metal does not attract lightning, but lightning can travel long distances through it.

When the thunder roars, go indoors!
